Children With Autism: Establishing Foundational Skills For Early Conversations

SEMINAR DESCRIPTION

Social interaction and conversational skills are critical to establishing positive peer regard and emotional and cognitive skills in children. Children with autism may possess functional language skills, but not demonstrate the ability or desire to use language to converse with others. Children with autism may lack foundational skills needed to move from using language to meet their own needs to using language to maintain interaction about shared interests and experiences.

This seminar will provide interventions to teach prerequisites to conversation. Methods to improve motivation for conversation and interaction will be detailed—including instruction in joint attention. Procedures to establish a strong expressive and receptive language repertoire—including labeling, receptive, and intraverbal skills—will be discussed and demonstrated via video clips. Strategies to teach children to request attention and information will be covered. Methods to assist children to respond to and discriminate WH questions will be explored and demonstrated via video clips. Several research-proven methods for "scripting" children to converse with others will receive emphasis.

The seminar will culminate with video demonstration of a successful social club and friendship camp. Strategies discussed will include: forming a social club which includes typical peers, training of peer models and support staff, establishing goals and curriculum, building theory of mind, and measuring improvement. The ultimate goal of this seminar is to provide participants with simple procedures to teach the skills needed to move children with autism toward more meaningful interactions. (Focus will be







Teaching Children With Developmental Disabilities

SEMINAR DESCRIPTION

This empowering two-day seminar will examine the current literature on teaching children with developmental challenges to speak. Four leading experts in speech acquisition will explore communication disorders and treatment solutions associated with autism, apraxia of speech, Down syndrome, and other populations. The latest research on the neuroscience of speech acquisition will be discussed to help participants become more effective in treatment planning and technique selection.

Also covered will be differential diagnosis of speech disorders, giving participants the knowledge to select and implement the most effective interventions. In addition, the rationale for incorporating word simplification, systematic reinforcement, and oral placement therapy will be discussed to help participants master the process of developing intervention programs that result in functional verbal outcomes. (Focus will be children ages 2-10.)

SEMINAR OBJECTIVES

At seminar conclusion, participants will be able to:

- Describe a hierarchy of simple to complex motor-speech skills.
- Utilize this hierarchy to evaluate children who have severe speech disorders.
- Implement a specific treatment approach using phonological simplifications for children with apraxia of speech.
- 4. List two skills required for the development of verbal language.
- 5. Explain the rationale of using reinforcement in the teaching of verbal skills.
- 6. Explain the rationale of using manual communication in conjunction with teaching verbal language.
- Apply current neuroscience research on dorsal and ventral, right and left hemisphere, and language processing networks to differentially diagnosis motor speech and phonological components of speech and language
- Utilize current neurodevelopment and genetics research in assisting parents, clinicians, and other professionals to understand the underlying neuropathology of developmental language and cognitive disorders.
- Integrate mirror-neuron research to evaluate and select evidence-based approaches for motor-speech and phonological interventions.
- 10. Learn new oral placement therapy techniques for increasing sentence length.
- 11. Understand the relationship between jaw stability and speech clarity.
- 12. Explain why lingual grading is a component of standard /s/ and /z/ production


